

HIGH COUNTRY TRIP REPORT

How lucky are we to be part of a club that takes us to places like the High Country? Those of us who went on the recent CC4WD trip there were greeted by our amazing trip leader Lachy in Jindabyne on what was a beautiful, sunny ANZAC Day. From there we made our way into the High Country, heading in through Alpine Way where we lowered our gears to do the steep, windy decline into Tom Groggin Campground. After finding the perfect spot for the convoy of eight to settle in for the three nights we began setting up. Being Dom and my first club trip we straight away saw the helpful nature of the club

with Bev and Greg helping us with our dramatic sized gazebo, and later Greg helping Dom fix our gas bottle on what would be the start of a beautiful bromance. Once set up we gathered round the campfire where the longer standing members welcomed Dom and I, and the other pair of newbies, Marie and Andrew, to the club. It was a great first night with some campfire cooking and watching Dom, Drew and Dave battle out who could go the longest without switching from shorts to pants.

The next morning we woke to temperatures just a pinch lower than the Central Coast with our trusty weather woman Michelle informing us it got down to zero during the night. After saying our good mornings to the roos mowing our campsite we were off, with Lachy and Liz at the front, and Greg and Bev as tail-end Charlie. The plan for the day was to explore the Victorian side of the border. Soon after turning out of the campsite we did our first Murray River crossing of the trip. While the low water levels meant the crossing didn't pose a challenge, there was a fun little bog hole waiting for us on the other side. From there we made our way up some inclines with many 'whoops' along the way before reaching Dogman's Hut which was full of character, however I did have to cover my ears as Bob recalled its history. Next came a very dusty drive to Wheeler's Creek Hut as the High Country hadn't seen rain for a while. It was socks on snorkels to prevent the dust coming through, and Rhonda and Drew kindly looked out for my snorkel too and provided me with a sock.

The scenery of the High Country changes drastically as you drive through it, from dense green bush, to long narrow trees to open shrubbery. The climb to Mount Gibbo is rocky, steep, open and provides, in my opinion, one the most iconic views of the High Country. Unsurprisingly there were other keen 4WDers up the top of Mt Gibbo enjoying the absolutely stunning 360 views it provides. We parked up, had a bite to eat and took in the endless sights, staring out at beautiful mountains that looked like they went on forever, which is how long I could've spent looking at them but Mt Pinnibar awaited us! Again we faced very steep and rocky terrain as we drove down from Mt Gibbo on a track that also provided neverending views, and made our way up to Mt Pinnibar where Lachy directed the convoy to park in a perfect line with another gorgeous backdrop. After a big day, we made our way back to camp and crossed back over the Murray with the moon bouncing off it at dusk. We settled in for another fun night around the campfire full of storytelling and jokes.





It was an eventful next morning with Dom and I having a brief encounter with two brumbies in the early hours, and the sun coming up to reveal the front left tyre of my Navara had deflated throughout the night. There was no need to stress though as I had just learnt to change and repair a tyre at driver's training, Michelle was loving the irony! Ok, maybe no need to stress because Dave and Lachy were there... With their assistance we did the "soapy water" trick, whereby, after pumping the tyre back up, I reversed slowly as they poured soapy water over it to reveal where the puncture was. 

We were lucky to have such a knowledgeable guide showing us more huts of the High Country, although many are reconstructed, it's interesting to see what they would have looked like and the purposes for which they were built. The first hut of the day was Geehi's Hut, however it was rivalled by a group of motorbikes parked around it which many of the convoy were interested in. After that was Keeble's Hut followed by Old Geehi's Hut. Many of the huts had a campground attached and were surrounded by beautiful scenery, it would be a challenge planning a High Country trip just to decide between which of the amazing places throughout it to camp at!



Following Old Geehi's Hut we journeyed on to see our first town in a couple of days, Khancoban, originally known as "Swampy Plain". Khancoban greeted us with an avenue of trees bursting with striking autumn colours, and with sealed roads for the rest of the trip we took the opportunity to air up. We had an hour or so of free time to explore the little town, with some of us opting to check out the local pub which was a mix of old and new interior. We then headed up to Bradley's Hut, Cabramurra. Of all the huts, this one is the eeriest because they say, if you listen really closely, you can hear ghosts of old residents faintly whispering, "Gregggggggg". Our last stop of the day was Tooma Dam before heading back to camp but not before seeing two beautiful brumbies close to Tom Groggin. We had our final night by the fire reflecting on a great trip.

COOLAH TOPS TRIP REPORT

Lachy's official trip start was on Saturday the 25th of May, but Chris Mitchell and I decided to head up to Merriwa and camp overnight on the Friday. We set up camp in the Merriwa Sports and Bowling Club, just as you enter town on the Golden Highway. The club offers free camping at the back of the club and we took advantage of that. Heading over for a few beers and a meal. It's a very friendly club and spoke with a few locals. We headed back to our camp and watched the end of the football on my Ipad.

Saturday morning, headed straight down to the Merriwa Bakery for a Bacon and egg roll for breakfast. To our surprise, met up with Anthony and Kylie Gavin, who had stayed at the Merriwa RSL Club free camp site. They had come over for breakfast too. Then bumped into Scott Taylor, who had just arrived. Also just leaving the Bakery, was Lachy's dad, who also came along for the trip. Popular spot.

After breakfast, headed up to the Silo art, where Lachy and others were waiting. After a briefing of the day's events, we headed off out of town via some back roads. Only to come to a halt as the planned roadway was closed. So back to the Golden Highway, heading towards the Coolah turnoff.

Just a little info regrading the Silo art and Merriwa. Merriwa silo is the 29th Silo out of 61 silos painted throughout most states of Australia. The Merriwa one was completed in April 2019 and used 160 litres of primer and 280 litres of paint to finish. The design has a back drop of Canola crops and a windmill in the background. Merriwa was once known as the town of windmills. Also a timber slab hut, common in the area used by early settlers and shepherds. And of course a couple of sheep, with one wearing trendy red socks.

Now the story goes of the famous Merriwa festival of the Fleeces, which started in 1990. The festival starts on each June long



weekend and is known for the running of the sheep down the main street, which kicks off the street parade. Several sponsors came on board but one of them could not afford to provide money, so all they could provide was red socks. One of the festival committee members came up with the idea off dressing the sheep with the red socks and so the tradition was born, and carried on throughout each festival and is depicted on the silo.

The festival highlights the Merino sheep in the area and with the Grand Parade, celebrates and highlights 'Life on the Land.' Now back on the road, our convoy travelled down the Coolah turn off and about 5 kilometres short of town, we turned towards the Coolah National Park. After airing down, we made our way up to the top of the mountain range, making our way to The Pines campground. We set up camp and had a bite to eat for lunch, then time for a drive around the park. Had a look at a couple of waterfalls and some short bush walking tracks, leading to some spectacular views.

Visited Brackens Hut, which was close by and we were able to go inside. Very basic living standards, 2 bedrooms and a combination living room/ kitchen. A good open fire, which would have been very welcoming up there in the depths of Winter. Nice size verandah at the front too. After a walk around the area, we made our way back to camp. Time to get the fire going and some drinks and nibblies to talk about the days adventures. Then get something happening for dinner then back to sitting around the fire.



Sunday morning after breakfast, we discussed the mornings walk. The original plan was to drive down The Pinnacle Road to the Pinnacle Lookout, but unfortunately, that road was closed for maintenance. Lachy decided it was a great idea to walk it instead. Yeah, great idea, only just over 6km in and that means 6km back. We walked down a track that took us to Cox's Creek Sawmill. There was the remains of an old steam engine that would of powered the Mill, alongside an old and decomposing Ford truck that was now in it's final parking spot. Chris and I were lagging behind a bit from the main group so we decided to return back to camp. They all finally returned back to the camp around lunchtime. As Chris and I had returned to camp, I cannot tell the story past this point. I'll let Glenn tell the story in the next 3 paragraphs.

Not to be discouraged by the road closures National Parks put in place, Lachy suggested we walk instead of driving out to the Pinnacle Lookout, claiming it offered the best 270-degree views around. We started our trek down the Pinnacle Road, stopping by Cox's Creek Campground, an old sawmill, and the Barracks Campground on the way. From there, our group split, with Pete and Chris heading back to camp and the remaining six continuing on.

About 5 km in, we ventured off the road and took a track to save some time heading to the lookout. It was barely a track in places, but thanks to Scott's map, we stayed on course. On the way to the lookout, we stumbled upon a couple of wild goats and kangaroos grazing in a field. After roughly 7 km of walking, the track eventually opened up to the lookout and the 270-degree view Lachy promised. It was so worth the walk. What an amazing lookout! We were so high up, the eagles circling the valley on either side of us were almost at eye level. Five of the six people were brave enough to step right out to the edge of the lookout.



We stayed at the lookout for some morning tea, then continued back via a short detour to the Bundella Lookout, which was not quite as impressive as the Pinnacle but still worth the look. We set off again back down the Pinnacle Road towards the cars and crossed paths with a National Parks ranger on his way out to the Pinnacle; his timing could not have been better. Kylie's new hiking boots were getting too sore to walk in, and she had stopped for a rest about a kilometre down the road. Without hesitation, he offered to pick her up and give her a lift back to the car. What an awesome bloke! We were all a bit sore and pleased to sit down once we got back to the cars. It was a 14 km round trip and an awesome way to spend the morning.

Thanks Glenn for filling in the gaps of the story. The Ranger had attended our camp before catching up with the group on the track. He let me know that there were a few spots around the camp ground that we could see deer. Not far from where were camped, was a low lying flat area that did seem to attract a lot of kangaroo's for feed. A walk down there in the late afternoon did not expose any deer or any other exotic animal. Only endless screeching Sulphur Crested Cockatoo's ,that seemed to circle us. They may have been warning the deer that we were waiting for them.

Chris and I had decided to spend the extra night at the campground while the rest of the team started making their way back home. As we had come all this way, it was nice to spend the extra night camping and head home on Monday. I took the Weber Baby Q again with me and we made pizza for Sunday night dinner.



The rest of the team had left some time after lunch and headed down the mountain and made their way through Blackville, Jacks Creek and Kankool. Finally making their way out at Willow Tree, now joining The New England Highway, now on a course for home.

Monday morning, time to pack up camp and head down the mountain. Stopping in Coolah to top up the fuel tank, then making our way back to the Merriwa Bakery for lunch. Finally time to make our way home.

Our team includes, Lachy Thomas (Trip Leader), Steve Thomas (Lachy's Dad), Anthony and Kylie Gavin, Chris Mitchell, Scott Taylor and I.

Thanks again Lachy for putting on this trip and looking forward for more, and more members to come along on these trips too.




Sunday





TRIP BOOK-IN PROCEDURE

Please familiarise yourself with these procedures to avoid any frustration

1. You must personally book in

2. If you book in early you must confirm that you still intend going no later than two weeks before the trip. If you do not confirm, your position will be re-allocated

3. If you are unable to attend please notify the trip leader as soon as possible so that someone else has the opportunity to fill the position

4. It is YOUR RESPONSIBILITY to contact the trip leader the night before the trip. This will enable you to confirm your attendance, and also check that the trip hasn't been affected by weather conditions

TRIP CLASSIFICATION CODES

A. This class of trip is considered to be extremely difficult. Participants will have to be experienced at travelling over difficult terrain. An amount of winching and/or towing will almost definitely be required. Participants will be required to bring along basic recovery equipment. The trip leader will have the right to reject a request to go from someone who is considered under experienced.

B. This class of trip is considered to be a moderate to difficult trip. An amount of winching and/or towing will almost certainly be required. Under extreme weather conditions, this trip could develop into a class A trip.

C. This class of trip is considered to be a moderate trip. Various sections of this trip will require cautious driving in order to negotiate your way. In most circumstances winching and/or towing will not be necessary.

D. This class of trip is considered to be a relatively easy trip. It is unlikely that any winching and/or towing will be required.

E. This class of trip is considered to be very easy. Little or no four wheel driving will be required and these trips usually consist of easy to reach base camps, scenic tours, social events, etc.

IMPORTANT NOTE: ALL B AND C TRIPS YOUR VEHICLE MUST BE ABLE TO ENGAGE LOW

RANGE. These classifications codes are a GUIDE ONLY. The code designated to a trip can change from the time of designation to the actual time of the trip. Although every attempt is made to ensure that an accurate class is given to each trip, members should be sure for themselves that they are capable of handling the type of trip they have chosen. If in doubt consult the trip leader, and they will advise you whether you and your vehicle are suitable.



TOLL REBATES FOR CARAVANS

Many of you that travel with caravans and camper trailers, may not be aware of some Toll charges for over height vehicles. Heights and lengths on Toll roads have been set, but on some occasions, cameras fitted on the Toll roads may consider your height and length may place you in the higher category. The difference in charges is quite significant.

To obtain any rebate for over charging, you need to register with Service NSW. If you look up **'Apply for Large Towed Recreational Vehicle Toll Rebate'**, you can register here.

Alternatively, you can contact them on 1300 133 310 for further details.

I did register last year and received a rebate of \$9.07. I received an email from Service NSW in late April, advising that I have received a rebate/refund of \$74.22. This amount has been credited to my E Toll account.

It is worth registering if you have a large caravan or camper trailer, as the cameras may detect you as the higher class of vehicle. Unless you check your E Toll account, you may not be aware of what you may have been charged.



I checked the current rates with the North Connex Tunnel, the vehicle rate (Class A) is now \$9.66 per journey, up from \$9.56 as of the 1 April 2024. And heavy vehicles (Class B) are now \$28.97, up from \$28.68, also as from the 1 April 2024.


I had been charged Class B a couple of times in the North Connex and on the M2 and M7 towing my caravan. It is well worth checking you E Toll account, as they do charge the higher rate, if their cameras detect a larger vehicle. Speaking with another member of another 4 WD Club, he had been over charged as he had push bikes on roof racks of his vehicle and the cameras detected his vehicle as Class B. A guide for vehicle dimensions and the Toll rate is shown here. Motor homes are not exempt as they are over the 2.8metre height. This rebate scheme does not include the Sydney Harbour Bridge and the Sydney Harbour Tunnel.

Who is eligible

To be eligible for the rebate, you must:

- · be registered for the rebate
- · be a NSW resident
- have both the car and towed recreational vehicle registered in NSW for private, pensioner or charitable use
- have travelled on a NSW toll road with a car, caravan, boat, or horse float combination detected as a Class B vehicle, and had a Class B toll charged to your toll account
- have paid Class B tolls with your NSW issued electronic tag
- · have paid the toll in full
- claim your rebate within 12 months after you receive your toll statement.

Note: the rebate scheme is not available for motorhome toll costs.





CONVOY PROCEDURE

- · Trip leaders to remind all drivers about convoy procedure before moving off
- Trip leaders to check that everyone on the trip has enough water, fuel, recovery gear and food
- Trip leaders to inform all participants of the radio channel (and alternate radio channel in the event of too much interference on the first channel) to be used and ensure everyone can hear them before moving off
- The trip leader will appoint a "Tail End Charlie" who always travels at the back of the convoy. Their job is to acknowledge and confirm all communication from the trip leader and ensure all vehicles are on the road whenever setting off
- Trip leaders to let Tail End Charlie know the state of any gates (whether open or closed) and Tail End Charlie must leave them in the same state they were found in
- Trip leaders to advise all participants of upcoming turns/hazards etc and make sure the Tail End Charlie has acknowledged any communication
- Do not drive in a manner or at a speed that could endanger yourself or any another participant
- If driving through steep or hazardous terrain always ensure the vehicle in front has passed through the hazard/steep section before you proceed and pay particular attention to the vehicle behind you, to ensure they've safely navigated the hazard
- Make sure you maintain visual contact with the vehicle behind you. At intersections, stop and wait until the driver behind acknowledges they've seen the turn
- · If you need to leave the convoy, you must let the trip leader know
- If the convoy gets too spread out, the trip leader can appoint someone to be a relay between the trip leader and Tail End Charlie
- If a recovery is necessary, the trip leader will take control and delegate if necessary. If you're not directly involved, make sure you stay well away from the recovery
- When in convoy, stay in your designated position. Eg: 4th car in the convoy. Do not overtake the vehicle in front without their permission
- · Do not reverse or drive in the opposite direction to other vehicles in the convoy
- · Always drive with headlights on
- Although the preferred communication is by radio, if you can't contact other drivers via radio, you should flash your headlights
- Using radios to communicate doesn't replace the need for convoy procedures to keep everyone safe and on the right track



TRIP NOTICES

First of all, a big thanks to you for running a trip! We appreciate that there is a lot of planning

and thought which goes in to leading a trip.

When you are writing up your trip report to be advertised in the magazine, please include the following details:

Trip Leader: Name and contact details
Where to meet: Include as much detail as possible including the time
The location of the trip:
The Grade of the trip: Please refer to the Trip Classification codes
Vehicle limit: the maximum number of vehicles permitted on the trip
What to bring: Please be detailed here eg: food and water requirements, a bag of firewood, full tank of fuel, recovery gear, swimmers
Minimum requirements: Eg: must have completed stage 1 or 2 driver awareness, snorkel, recovery points, working UHF radio, winch
Costs: Please note here if there are any costs involved. Eg: camping fees, museum or entry fees, booking fees, meals, accommodation etc

Please then write a summary of the trip so people know whether the trip would be suitable for them. Include where you'll be heading, where'll you camp/stay, any highlights/points of interest along the way, then conclude with how, when and where the trip will finish up.

Another fantastic addition to any trip notice are some photos you have taken on previous trips to showcase some of the highlights of the trip. Please do not leave this up to the editor to include any photos.

Once you have all the details in your trip notice, please email in Word or Publisher format to

tripmaster@cc4wdc.org.au so the Trip Master can log the trip AND to editor@cc4wdc.org.au so it can be included in the next magazine.



There are written and verbal trip reports for each Club trip undertaken. At the beginning of each trip, the Trip Leader will request a volunteer for the written and verbal reports. Usually, the last person to turn up to the meeting place is assigned the coveted job of writing the trip report for the magazine.

HOW TO SUBMIT A TRIP REPORT

- Take notes as you travel and take lots of photos along the way
- When you get home, type up your report in Word or Publisher and include your photos in the document.

Visitors must have a club member with them.

Please follow the guidelines set out in the following pages, including signing in and out on the forms provided in the café.

Remember, no pets at the lease, don't feed any of the farm animals, or wild animals and please be conscious of turning off the gas bottles after you use the gas



GUIDELINES FOR USE OF WE-LEASER

These guidelines have been prepared in conjunction with the property owner and reflect the

club's ethics to ensure that everyone enjoys their time at the property.

- Everyone is expected to treat the property with care and respect.
- Club members must accompany any visitors for duration of stay.
- You must sign in on the forms provided as soon as you arrive. Sign in forms are located in the box attached to the pole inside the café.
- Always check current fire restrictions for the area before lighting a fire. Make sure that the fire is properly extinguished before the last person goes to bed and/or before leaving the property.
- · Please use the established firepit to avoid fire burns all
- Rubbish must all be taken home with you.
- We only lease the 30 acres around the camping area. Please do not drive to any other parts of the property.
- Motor bikes and any unregistered vehicles are not allowed on the property. We aren't insured for these, and our lease doesn't allow it.
- Don't feed the animals on the property.
- When-ever possible, replace firewood you use with timber from outside the property. Do not collect fire-wood from the property.
- The tanks on the property collect rainwater and are not for drinking. They may also be empty if it hasn't recently rained, so please always carry your own water.
- When using the barbecue or the burners, please turn off the gas at the bottle as soon as you finish cook-ing, otherwise it will leak. If the gas bottles are empty, there are 2 options:
- Pay to get them refilled and request reimbursement by emailing a copy of your receipt and bank de-tails to the treasurer at treasurer@cc4wdc.org.au
- Use our account at the garage at the top of the town as you come in (contact the lease manager for how to use our account if using this option). If using this option, please remember to email a copy of the invoice provided to you to treasurer@cc4wdc.org.au
- No domestic animals or pets are allowed
- Before you leave, please check the following:
 - Double check the gas is off at the bottle to ensure no leakage
 - Make sure the café gates are closed so livestock can't get in and make a mess
 Make sure the toilet and shower doors are closed.

Front Entrance - The entry to the Lease from Main Creek Road. (thru gate marked by a Black Sign with a White Circle on it)

Lease Road - Dirt road that runs from the Lease Entrance thru Carowiry Creek. From the creek it then runs across The Lower Camp Site and up to the Middle Camp Site. From the Middle Camp Site it then runs up past The Top Track to the Back gate

Carowiry Creek - Name of Creek at entrance to Lease.

The Lower Camp Site - First Camp site nearest to creek.

Middle Camp Site - Camp Site on which The Rosebud Café is located.

Top Camp Site - The Camp site which is located at the top of the hill next to the Storage Sheds and the Toilets.

Rosebud Cafe - Under cover B,B,Q / Kitchen Area. (Named many years ago when some children hung a bunch of plastic Rose flowers on to one of the Canteen support poles. (they are still there today)

Stairs - Run from canteen down to The Bottom Camp Site

Woodstock - Name given to the shed where wood is stacked.

Storage Sheds and Toilet Amenities - Located on hill 50m South of the Rosebud Cafe.

The Top Track - The North to South track that cuts across the top of the Lease.

Back Gate - Rear entrance to the Lease. (Entrance to Black Bulga State Forest area)

Wallaby Dam - A small dam located on the Northern Side of The Lease Road and halfway to The Back Gate.

Frog Hollow - Area of dense, dark forest which starts at the beginning of Walk 1 and runs thru to the 1.2.3. sign at the beginning of Cow Gully. (Maps of Lease Walks and instructions are found in the Lease Walks Log Book in the info cupboard.)

Cow Gully - The gully which acts as a water course for the Southern side of The Lease and runs from The Top Track down to Carowiry Creek.

Memorial Lookout - Small area dedicated to the memory of those that have passed. (Located 50m South of Back Gate)

REMEMBER

It is not safe to camp underneath Gum Trees as they often shed branches. Due to the agistment of stock on the Lease please leave all gates on the Lease as you find them.

Loading Your Vehicle and Caravan

Everything you pack weighs something

To determine how much you can pack, or your pay load, everything that is additional to the TARE mass of your caravan, plus everything you have packed must be weighed.

Don't overload your caravan

This table shows example weights of various items that may be part of a caravan's payload along with the caravan's tare and maximum carrying capacity to demonstrate how to measure the safe carrying capacity.



Maximum pack weight 400kg

What you pack, or your payload, must not exceed the lowest tow capacity of your towbar, towing vehicle, tyre capacity or caravan ATM.

FIRST AID KIT - BASICS

With increasing interest in the recent Bush First Aid course run by Sue from Express First Aid, I thought it would be good to examine what is available, what should a first aid kit contain, and where to purchase a recommended one.

What's required?

Carrying a First Aid kit within your vehicle is a must when driving remotely and recommended on all club trips. But what should your kit contain? Most have a collection of plasters, bandages and other first aid bits and bobs, but does it contain what is needed for trips out bush? Below are some of the contents a BASIC first aid kit should contain, but more is recommended for camping and 4WDing, customising your first aid kit depending on the activities you do.

A basic first aid kit checklist might include:

- · crepe bandages of varying widths
- hypoallergenic (skin) tape
- triangular bandages
- adhesive dressing strips (such as band aids) in different sizes
- gauze swabs
- combine dressing pads (10cm x 10cm)
- non-stick dressing pads (7.5cm x 10cm)
- sterile eye pad alcohol swabs
- stainless steel scissors (sharp/blunt) 12.5cm
- disposable gloves
- stainless steel pointed splinter forceps (tweezers)
- shock (thermal) blanket
- safety pins
- notepad and permanent marker
- sterile saline tubes/sachets
- · disposable resuscitation face shield
- antiseptic skin swabs
- stop itch cream
- first aid booklet



UHF RADIO CHANNELS - AUSTRALIA

Which channels to use and avoid

UHF (Ultra high frequency) radios are a commonplace accessory the vast majority of 4WDers use for general convoy communication on highways and tracks. It is important to remember that UHF transmissions are not private communication and anyone within range will hear your conversation so some simple etiquette is important. The UHF radio is a must have when going on 4WD trips. Below are the list of channels you should and shouldn't be using.

Acceptable UHF channels and their usage:

Channels 9, 12-17, 19-21 24-28, 30, 39, 49-60, 64-70, 79 and 80: General chat channels Channel 10: 4WD Clubs or Convoys and National Parks Channel 18: Caravanners and Campers Convoy Channel Channel 40: Australia Wide road safety channel used primarily by truckies and oversized load pilot vehicles Channel 29: Road safety channel Pacific Hwy/Mwy (NSW & QLD) Channels 1-8 and 41-48: Repeater/Duplex channels (output) Channels 31-38 and 71-78: Repeater/Duplex channels (input)

Legally restricted channels

Channel 5 and 35: are for emergency use only

Channel 11: is the 'call channel' - a general meeting channel for when communication has been lost. Once communication is established you should quickly move to another general chat channel. Channel 22 and 23: to be used for telemetry and telecommand automated communications only. Packet data and voice transmissions are not permitted

Please note: As at July 2020, the on the spot fine for misusing the emergency channels is \$444 OR up to 2 years imprisonment (for an individual) OR up to \$333,000 fine for all others. If the misuse interferes with an emergency call, these penalties increase to up to 5 years imprisonment for an individual OR up to \$1,110,000 fine for all others. These penalties are set to increase every 3 years from 1 July 2020.
